



Free Workshop on Native Plants and Waterwise Landscaping

Encinitas, CA—Olivenhain Municipal Water District and partners invite the public to attend a free Native Plants and Waterwise Landscaping Workshop. The workshop will be held on Saturday, March 14 from 10:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., in OMWD's boardroom, located at 1966 Olivenhain Road in Encinitas.

Steve Sherman from California Landscape Technologies will explain how to choose attractive, waterwise, low-maintenance, and non-invasive plants. Native plants naturally thrive in San Diego's soils and climate. They also support pollinators like bees, hummingbirds, and butterflies.

Plant options include dudleya, red buckwheat, and silver carpet. Attendees will also learn maintenance tips to help native plants grow and thrive. Participants are invited to tour OMWD's California-Friendly Demonstration Garden after the presentation for inspiration.

This workshop is offered in partnership with San Dieguito Water District, Santa Fe Irrigation District, and Escondido Creek Conservancy. Space is limited. Registration is required at www.olivenhain.com/events.

Olivenhain Municipal Water District is a public agency providing water, wastewater services, recycled water, hydroelectricity, and operation of Elfin Forest Recreational Reserve. Organized in 1959, OMWD currently serves approximately 87,000 customers over 48 square miles in northern San Diego County.

Formed in 1922, San Dieguito Water District is a public agency that provides potable and recycled water to over 5,600 acres and approximately 39,000 customers within the communities of Leucadia, Old Encinitas, Cardiff, and portions of New Encinitas.

Established in 1923, Santa Fe Irrigation District is a special district that provides potable and recycled water service to the city of Solana Beach, and portions of the communities of Rancho Santa Fe and Fairbanks Ranch.

Established in 1991, the mission of Escondido Creek Conservancy is to preserve and restore the Escondido Creek watershed. Flowing from the mountains above Lake Welford in Escondido to the San Elijo Lagoon and shores of Encinitas and Solana Beach, the Escondido Creek watershed encompasses over 75 square miles of land in North San Diego County.
